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Darius moreover (Ezra 5, 13, 17; 6-1-16) the worshipper of Ormazd favoured the rebuilding of the temple of Jerusalem as desired by Cyrus. Allusion of the Persians are perhaps contained in Ezck 8-16: Is 45-7, 12. See also Apocryphel, New Test The Infancy 3-1-10)"
